In *The Farce of Unfulfilment* a fifteen-year-old Canary develops an unhealthy relationship with the newly opened Limehouse Link tunnel after her foster carer, Jeremy Shaw, shares his dark fixation that the British National Party candidate who is about to win the 1993 Millwall by-election is her biological father.

That's all she remembers, as Canary's final chapter for the 20th century culminates in a blackout that lasts until the 2008 financial crisis, wherein our endlessly mutable narrator reappears after Britain's supposed boom time to market failure, a spiralling rentier economy and general disarray.
